and animals that help pollinate our food supply. The habitats of bees, butterflies, beetles and bats, and other animals are being destroyed. This is causing a rapid decline in their population, which causes a negative impact in our food supply. According to the lecture, one out of every three bites comes from a

pollinator, and this made me realize how important these animals are even though some may be deemed less pleasant than others. The speakers explored the different ways in which we can support these animals at different scales, with a collective effort from the landscape architecture

community. From what I took away from this session, I want to always strive to design something that will help the local pollinator populations, because if their habitats were to be destroyed, our ecosystem will be greatly affected. There were a lot of amazing products being shown at the expo, from


playground design companies to water-conservation systems. I would say my favorite booth has to be the Toro booth, because they were showcasing a product that really surprised me on how a small thing can have a huge impact in the future. I live in a desert where water conservation is a huge issue, and

where the water district keeps a close tab on all homeowners on their water usage. When I walked up to the Toro booth, one particular product that they were showcasing that caught my attention was the PrecisionTM Series Spray Nozzle. This nozzle replaces the traditional lawn sprinkler head and saves water when

watering your lawn. Toro states that this sprinkler head can save the homeowners money in water usage because this sprinkler head uses up to 60% less water while watering your lawn. This sprinkler head can cost a homeowner a pretty penny, but the Toro representative said that some water districts will


Afterwards, we were invited to a delightful reception at the ground floor of the City building. It was a great way to top off the night with some tiramisu, my favorite desert!

#### **Public Awareness Summit**



#### **25-YEAR MILESTONE MEMBER:** Stan Southwick

In celebration of Stan Southwick's long-term commitment please read a special interview that was conducted by UNLV student J. Alvarado last year's World Landscape Architecture Month. Stan, we are incredibly honored to have your dedication and experience in our state and look forward to many more years to come.





Interviewing a well-known landscape architect is nerve-wracking if you don't know that much about them. Fortunately, I have known Stan Southwick for about two years when he was involved in the design charrette for the Westside Project in my second-year studio. When I arrived at his office, I waited in the conference room and prepared myself for the interview since I was nervous about the questions I was going to ask him. Once he arrived, we were able to get a few laughs going and then we started the interview.

**Jack Alvarado:** What made you go into landscape architecture?

**Stan Southwick:** It started off in high school where I was interested in drafting, so I decided to study engineering until my senior year. My teacher, who was an architect, convinced me to study architecture and then I studied it during my freshman year of college. During that time, I became more fascinated with the outdoor environment, so when I found landscape architecture I found what I was looking for.

JA: What landscape architect has most influenced your design philosophy?

**SS:** There are many but there is one that really stands out. He still practices a little bit and his name is Steve Martino. Martino was lecturing when I first started out and I was impressed with how Martino handled things. His designs were desert-based and I needed that type of insight. I still refer to his work on certain projects.

JA: What kind of advice would you give for graduates that would soon enter in the profession?

SS: Have some field experience such as working for a landscape contractor because you will learn more

about how the design is physically built compared to putting it on paper.

JA: What resources do you use the most when working on any project?

**SS:** In my firm, past experiences would be the biggest resource as I have six landscape architects working for me and the youngest one has 15 years of experience. The internet is another resource that is commonly used now in my firm. In terms of software, my firm uses mainly AutoCAD, Photoshop, SketchUp. They also have a small library filled with catalogs, brochures and other sources of inspiration but we are mainly digital.

JA: What type of materials do you take with you while on a site visit?

**SS:** Typically, I will take a set of plans, a camera, and on some site visits our tablets to take photos and develop punch-lists that include the photos of the site with the site plan in "PlanGrid". Another tool that I take with me is a caliper tape to inspect the trees or anything similar to see if it's up to specs.

JA: Do you prefer a Mac or PC when you're working?

SS: My firm uses only PC's as mostly everyone in the profession uses PC's and not Mac.

JA: Have you seen resumes that are very unique and became drawn to it?

**SS:** I look at the first page to see if they have the right balance between graphics and verbiage. I have a strong preference to see the applicant's resume in one page and look for the important parts that the applicant wants to show otherwise he would go on to the next one.

**JA:** How did you put together your business plan and what type of advice can you give while making it?

**SS:** I looked on-line on how to do a business plan but many of the samples I found had language that only lawyers would understand, so I had to try and simplify it to a few pages.

JA: One final question: How is your firm unique compared to other firms in town?

**SS:** The way my firm is set up is that with six landscape architects on staff, it makes all the difference in the world when it comes down to design. Another critical element which is stated in my business plan is to create a firm that can work with a range of clients from architects to government officials and we continue getting work from previous clients.

After we concluded the interview, Southwick showed me some examples of his brochures that he would give to clients and allowed me to take a brief look at his business plan. This interview has given me insight as to how he does things in his firm both from the design and business aspects. Running a firm is no easy task because you must take into account so many elements ranging from finding clients to taking care of your employees. It is my belief that firms like Stan Southwick's would continue to thrive and everyone would want to work with him.


